Speaker motivates and inspires students

Choices face us every day, and we all have the ability

to make good choices whether we have made them in the past or not, according Al Duncan.

motivational speaker, spoke at the high school Tuesday.

In the morning he spoke first to the underclassmen and later to the upperclassmen. That afternoon he gave another talk to a smaller group of students who signed up individually.

Duncan spoke about goal setting, responsibility, and personal accountability. He grew up under bad conditions but went on to become a success as a professional saxophone player, an author and the host of a television show.

Duncan grew up the eldest of six siblings in North Philidelphia, an area known for its rough way of life. He was the victim of sexual abuse at the age of 5, and at 15 he found out his father was addicted to crack cocaine. Duncan's life seemed to be coming apart, but he overcame great adversity to break the cycle of poverty and addiction in his family.

Duncan encouraged students to further their educations and stressed that

"anyone who makes the right choices can go to college."

"As important as having knowledge," Duncan asserted, "is putting it to good use."

He likened someone who has knowledge but does not use it to a crazy man who has a new car but walks to work in the rain.

He urged the children to develop clear goals and write them down.

"Ninety-seven percent of people never write down their goals," said Duncan. "So, if you write down your goals, you're already in the top 3 percent."

Duncan also said that people develop a notion of what they think of you during the first four seconds \square See SPEAKER, Page 12A




that they meet you. Being confident and neat helps create a good first impression, he said.
